Dear Orange County Voter:

Thank you for being registered to vote so your voice can be heard regarding how your community is governed and by whom.

As your Registrar of Voters, it is my commitment that Orange County elections are fair, accurate, transparent, and accessible. This Voter Information Guide explains how, when, and where to vote in the March 5, 2024 Presidential Primary Election.

Please take a moment to review how to “**Vote Easy. Vote Secure.**” in this election:

- **Mail Ballots:** Pursuant to Elections Code section 3000.5, every voter must be mailed an official ballot. We will start delivering ballots to the U.S. Postal Service on February 5.
- **Vote Early at Home:** Mark your mail ballot at home and choose from three easy and secure options to return your ballot. Use one of our ballot drop boxes located throughout the county, place it in the mail (no postage required), or bring it to one of our Vote Centers by 8 p.m. on March 5. See all of your options at **ocvote.gov/options**.
- **Vote In-Person Over 11 days:** We will operate more than 180 full-service Vote Centers throughout the county where you can vote in-person. Select locations open daily beginning February 24; all Vote Centers will be open from March 2 through March 5. Vote early to avoid possible lines on the last day. You can vote at any location. For locations and hours, visit **ocvote.gov/votecenter**.

We work hard to make voting convenient and safe for all Orange County voters. On the Registrar of Voters’ website **ocvote.gov** and in this Voter Information Guide, you can learn about the assistance we provide to voters with disabilities and those whose primary language is not English. If you have not provided a political party preference with your voter registration, please review the How to Vote for President page of this Guide. Additionally, you can sign up to receive notifications to track your mail ballot with OC Ballot Express.

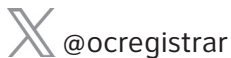

Can I vote if I register after the registration deadline?

Yes, conditional voter registration extends the 15-day registration deadline in California to eligible voters, allowing them to register and vote provisionally starting 14 days prior to an election and on Election Day, at the Registrar of Voters' office, located at 1300 S. Grand Ave., Bldg C, Santa Ana, 92705 or at any Vote Center.

Can I vote if I moved to another address in Orange County?

Yes, but you should register at your new address. You may vote and re-register at the:

- Registrar of Voters' office; or
- Any Vote Center

If you are voting by mail, you should re-register, and then request a replacement ballot after you confirm your registration has been updated.

To view your registration information, visit ocvote.gov/verify. To register online, visit: ocvote.gov/register.

Can I vote if I have not voted in the last 4 years?

RESIDENCE CONFIRMATION:

Yes. If you haven't voted recently, it is always a good idea to confirm your registration information is current. You can view your current voter information on our website, and confirm if your registration is current.

Voting assistance available at Vote Centers

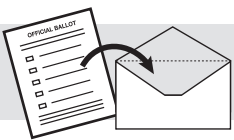
Every effort has been made to ensure all Vote Centers meet accessibility standards. Vote Centers will feature:

- Accessible voting machines to mark your ballot
- American Sign Language interpreter via video conferencing
- Curbside voting with paper ballot
- Additional assistance upon request

Voters that are unable to mark a ballot may bring up to two individuals to assist in voting (§ 14282 (b)).

Vote-by-Mail

Section 2

You can vote by mail before Election Day

Every voter in Orange County will receive a Vote-by-Mail ballot. You can mark your ballot and send it back by mail or drop it off at any Vote Center or ballot drop box. Vote-by-Mail ballots must be postmarked or delivered to a Vote Center or ballot drop box by **March 5**.

How to return your Vote-by-Mail ballot

Mark your ballot, then follow the instructions on the official envelope to sign and seal your ballot in the postage-paid envelope provided.

You can:

- **Mail** your ballot, so that it is postmarked by Election Day, March 5
- **Drop off** your ballot at any ballot drop box in Orange County. Visit ocvote.gov/dropbox for more information
- **Drop off** your ballot at any Vote Center in Orange County. Visit ocvote.gov/votecenter for more information
- **Hand-deliver** your ballot to the Orange County Registrar of Voters at:

If you are unable to return your ballot, you may use your Vote-by-Mail envelope to authorize someone you trust to return it for you.

If you drop off your ballot at a Vote Center, an employee will make sure your envelope is filled out correctly.

Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail Ballot

Any voter may cast a ballot using a certified Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail (RAVBM) system. The electronic ballot can be downloaded to the voter's computer, marked using the voter's own computer or assistive technology, then printed and returned by following the instructions included with the electronic ballot.

No later than seven days before Election Day, the voter may request the county elections official to send a ballot that voters with disabilities can read and mark privately and independently pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. Sec. 20901 et seq.).

Replacement Ballots

If you need a replacement ballot, you can request one using the following methods:

- Online at ocvote.gov/replacement (available after ballots are mailed until 7 days before the election).
- Over the phone at 714-567-7600 (available after ballots are mailed until 7 days before the election).
- At any Vote Center during the in-person voting period (see hours and locations in this guide).

Please note: Vote-by-Mail ballots will be mailed beginning on February 5. Please allow adequate time for delivery.

How do primaries work in California?

In a Primary Election, voters choose candidates to run in the General Election in November.

For the March 5, 2024 Presidential Primary Election, if your voter registration contains a political party preference, you will receive a ballot with Party-Nominated, Voter-Nominated and Nonpartisan contests. If you are a No Party Preference voter, please see the How to Vote for President page in this Guide for your ballot options for this election.

In **Presidential (Party-Nominated) offices**, only voters in the same political party can vote for these candidates.

In a **California Top-Two Primary**, for **Voter-Nominated offices**, you can vote for any candidate, no matter what your party preference is.

- **All voters** can vote in the Top-Two Primary.
- You can vote for **any candidate** or write in a candidate.
- A candidate's **party preference** is shown with his/her name. If a candidate is not registered with a party, his/her party preference is listed as "None."
- **The Top Two vote-getters** move on to the General Election in November. It is possible that the top two could be from the same party.

For **county or local offices** in a **Nonpartisan Primary**, all voters can vote for **any candidate**.

- The candidates' party preference does not appear on the ballot.
- If a candidate receives 50% plus 1 vote in the Primary, that candidate is elected.
- If no candidate receives 50% plus 1 vote, the top two vote-getters go to a run-off at the November General Election, except for County Board of Education Member, where the top vote-getter is elected.

Why do we have a "Top-Two Primary"?

Proposition 14, passed by California voters on June 8, 2010, created the Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act. This act requires that the two candidates receiving the greatest number of votes in the Primary Election will appear on the General Election ballot regardless of party preference.



Party preference

What used to be called “party affiliation” is now called “party preference” according to California law. If you did not choose a political party when you registered to vote, you are a **No Party Preference** voter, or **NPP** for short (previously known as “Decline-to-State”).

Do you want to vote for President in the Presidential Primary?

If you are a “No Party Preference” voter, the nonpartisan ballot that will be mailed to you for the March 5, 2024 Presidential Primary Election will not include the Presidential contest. “No Party Preference” voters may request and vote a ballot of a qualified political party that allows cross-over voting by “No Party Preference” voters.

For the 2024 Presidential Primary Election, the following parties have agreed to allow “No Party Preference” voters to vote their party’s ballot for the President of the United States contest:

- **American Independent Party**
- **Democratic Party**
- **Libertarian Party**

The other qualified parties did not agree to allow “No Party Preference” voters to vote their party’s ballots. To receive a ballot for the Green Party, Peace and Freedom Party, or Republican party, you must re-register to vote.

If you are a “No Party Preference voter”, you have 3 options:

• **Nonpartisan**

If you do not want to vote for any political parties, do nothing and you will receive a nonpartisan ballot, which will have:

- Candidates for voter-nominated and nonpartisan offices
- Ballot measures, if applicable

• **American Independent**

- **Democratic**
- **Libertarian**

If you want to vote for the above parties, you can select the party ballot at a Vote Center, or to vote by mail, request a ballot at **ocvote.com/npp**.

• **Green**

- **Peace and Freedom**
- **Republican**

If you want to vote for the above parties, you must re-register to vote with that party.

Translated reference ballots in Tagalog, Farsi (Persian), Hindi, Japanese, and Gujarati of eligible precincts will be available at all Vote Centers in Orange County. You may also cast a Vote-by-Mail ballot in person at a Vote Center. For hours and locations, turn to the Vote Center Locations section of this guide or visit ocvote.gov/voting.

No later than seven days before the day of the election, the voter may request a vote-by-mail ballot in Spanish, Vietnamese, Chinese or Korean, or a translated reference ballot in Tagalog, Farsi (Persian), Hindi, Japanese, or Gujarati for voters in eligible precincts.

Voters in eligible precincts may request a translated reference ballot through the included postage-paid postcard, or contact our office at:

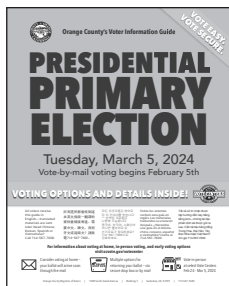

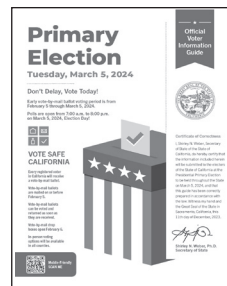

U.S. Senate contest

There are two U.S. Senate contests on the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election ballot.

The first contest is the regular election for the full 6-year term ending January 3, 2031.

The second contest is a special vacancy election (the current officeholder is temporarily filling a vacancy) for the remainder of the current term ending January 3, 2025.

You may vote for both contests.

Voluntary campaign spending limits

Proposition 34, passed by California voters on November 7, 2000, provides that state legislative candidates who voluntarily agree to limit their campaign spending may have Candidates' Statements included in the Voter Information Guide.

Charter Amendment Measure No. 1

Section 702. PROCEDURE FOR HOLDING ELECTIONS.

All elections shall be held in accordance with the provisions of the Elections Code of the State of California, as the same now exists or hereafter may be amended, for the holding of municipal elections, so far as the same are not in conflict with this Charter. In the event of such conflict, the provisions of this Charter shall control and prevail, in accordance with Section 103 of this Charter.

Section 705. SPECIAL PROVISIONS RELATING TO MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

As in Section 300, the City Charter shall determine the term of the City's elective officers, the length of term, and the election cycle in which the election for those offices occur for the City's elective officers.

(a) Beginning in 2026, for all municipal elections:

- (1) "Elector" means a person who is a United States citizen 18 years of age or older, and a resident of the City on or before the day of an election.
- (2) The City may verify the eligibility of Electors by voter identification.
- (3) The City may provide at least 20 Americans with Disabilities Act compliant voting locations for in-person voting dispersed evenly throughout the City, in addition to any City facility voting locations.
- (4) The City may monitor ballot drop boxes located within the City for compliance with all applicable laws.

Impartial Analysis

Measure A

CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE 1

This proposed Charter amendment, if adopted, would amend the Charter related to City elections. Huntington Beach is a Charter City which is authorized by the State Constitution to determine how it conducts City elections. The Charter currently provides that all elections shall be held in accordance with the provisions of the California Elections Code, so far as they do not conflict with the Charter.

This ballot measure proposes to amend Section 702 of the Charter to provide that in the event of a conflict between the Elections Code and the Charter, the provisions of the Charter shall control and prevail. This ballot measure also proposes to add new Section 705 to the Charter, which would: reaffirm the Charter's authority over the term of the City's elective officers, their length of term and their election cycle; and beginning in 2026, define the qualifications of an Elector in a City election as a United States citizen at least 18 years of age, and a resident of the City on or before the day of an election.

This ballot measure would also authorize, but not require, the City to: verify the eligibility of Electors by voter identification; provide at least 20 ADA compliant voting locations for in-person voting dispersed throughout the City, in addition to any City facility voting locations; and monitor ballot drop boxes located within the City for compliance with all applicable laws.

The adoption of this Measure may result in additional, currently undetermined costs to the City, because the City does not currently perform the described election activities; if the Measure is adopted, and the City chooses to implement the described election activities, it will increase the City's election related costs in an amount that cannot be precisely determined at this time.

A "yes" vote on this measure would add new Section 705 to the Charter, and add the conflict resolution language to current Section 702. A "no" vote on this measure would not add new Section 705, and leave Section 702 in place as it currently exists.

This Measure was placed on the ballot by the City Council.

Argument in Favor of Measure A

Huntington Beach voters deserve the right to know that our elections are secure. It is crucial for our democracy that voters have faith in our election results. That trust in the outcome of elections comes into question when we can't always be certain who is voting.

California's Constitution gives Charter Cities like Huntington Beach the power to govern how local elections are conducted. Some cities, like San Francisco, have used that power to let illegal immigrants cast ballots. And now those extreme policies have been spreading and are being pushed as close as Santa Ana.

This Charter Amendment Measure would permanently protect the election process in Huntington Beach by requiring three things. It would require voters to provide any government issued photo identification, it adds more handicapped accessible polling locations throughout the City so everyone has a polling place nearby, and it requires monitoring of all ballot drop boxes up through Election Day.

Enshrining these simple steps into our City Charter would forever protect Huntington Beach's elections. There are no excuses for failing to protect our votes.

Rebuttal to Argument in Favor of Measure A

Our elections are ALREADY SECURE, overseen by the award-winning, ISO-certified Orange County Registrar of Voters. Measure 1 misleads voters, threatening this security by potentially forcing Huntington Beach to conduct its own elections, a task for which the city is **UNPREPARED** and **LACKS INFRASTRUCTURE**. This could cost millions, an unnecessary financial burden.

Claims that this measure requires government-issued photo identification are **MISLEADING**; this requirement is absent from the amendment. Federal law already requires accessibility at all polling places for those with disabilities, making additional ADA-compliant locations **REDUNDANT**. The proposed monitoring of ballot drop boxes is a form of **VOTER INTIMIDATION**, creating fear and uncertainty. These items are all subject to challenge under state and federal law. Again, more of our money flowing out of the city, spent on needless court costs.

CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE 2

This proposed Charter amendment, if adopted, would amend the City Charter by adding new Section 806 related to the City's display of flags on City property, to read as follows:

"SECTION 806. DISPLAY OF FLAGS. Except as otherwise provided herein, the City shall only fly or display at or on any of the City's properties the following flags: the American flag, the POW/MIA flag, the State of California flag, the Huntington Beach City flag, the County of Orange flag, or any of the flags of the six branches of service: the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, Marine Corps, and Space Force. During the Summer Olympic Games, the Mayor is authorized to order the display of the official Olympic flags for four weeks prior to the dates of the games, and for up to two weeks thereafter. The City may display any other flag in addition to those already enumerated, but only if authorized by a unanimous vote of all members of the City Council."

The proposed Charter amendment is nearly identical to current law set forth in Huntington Beach Municipal Code Section 13.07.010, with new language included in the ballot measure about the display of the official Olympic flags, and the display any other flag in addition to those already enumerated if authorized by a unanimous vote of all members of the City Council.

A "yes" vote on this measure would add new Section 806 to the Charter. A "no" vote on this measure would not add new Section 806.

This measure was placed on the ballot by the City Council.

Huntington Beach is an American city within the United States of America where all citizens are equally represented first and foremost under our government flag, the American flag. There is no other flag that represents unity and equality more than our American flag, favoring no other persons or groups over others. Charter Amendment Measure No. 3

Section 300. CITY COUNCIL, ATTORNEY, CLERK AND TREASURER. TERMS. The elective officers of the City shall consist of a City Council of seven members, a City Clerk, a City Treasurer and a City Attorney, all to be elected from the City at large at the times and in the manner provided in this Charter and who shall serve for terms of four years and until their respective successors qualify. Subject to the provisions of this Charter, the members of the City Council in office at the time this Charter takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected and qualified. Consistent with the staggered election process established in the new Charter in 1966 and reaffirmed in 2024, four members of the City Council shall be elected at the general municipal election held in ~~1966~~ 2022, and each fourth year thereafter. Three members of the City Council shall be elected at the general municipal election held in ~~1968~~ 2024, and each fourth year thereafter. No person shall be elected as a member of the City Council for more than two consecutive terms and no person who has been a member for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected a member shall be elected to the City Council more than one further consecutive term. Subject to the provisions of this Charter, the City Clerk, City Treasurer and City Attorney in office at the time this Charter takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms and the qualification of their successors. Consistent with the staggered election process established in the new Charter in 1966 and reaffirmed in 2024, a City Clerk and City Treasurer shall be elected at the general municipal election held in ~~1968~~ 2024, and each fourth year thereafter. A City Attorney shall be elected in ~~1966~~ 2022, and each fourth year thereafter.

The term of each member of the City Council, the City Clerk, the City Treasurer and the City Attorney shall commence on the first ~~Monday~~ regular City Council meeting following the certification of the election. Ties in voting among candidates for office shall be settled by ~~the casting of lots~~ random drawing process conducted by the City Manager during the first regular City Council meeting following the certification.

If no candidate meets the qualifications for office of the City Clerk, City Treasurer, or City Attorney, the City Council shall fill that position by appointment until the next municipal general election in which a qualified candidate is elected.

Section 303. MEETINGS AND LOCATION.

(a) **Regular Meetings.** The City Council shall hold regular meetings at least twice each month, unless it lacks a quorum or is canceled by the Mayor or a majority of City Council Members, at such time as it shall fix by ordinance or resolution. ~~In no event shall the City Council meet less than once each month, and The City Council may adjourn or re-adjoin any regular meeting to a date and hour certain which shall be specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned Each re-adjoined meeting shall be a regular meeting for all purposes. If the hour to which a meeting is adjourned is not stated in the order of adjournment, such meeting shall be held at the hour for holding regular meetings.~~ If at any time any regular meeting falls on a holiday such regular meeting shall be held on the next business day.

(b) **Special Meetings.** A special meeting may be called at any time by the Mayor, or by a majority of the members of the City Council, by written notice or current technology to each member of the City Council and to each local newspaper of general circulation, radio or television station requesting notice in writing. Such notice must be delivered personally, ~~or by mail~~ or by current technology at least twenty-four hours before the time of such meeting as specified in the notice.

The call and notice shall specify the time and place of the special meeting and the business to be transacted. No other business shall be considered at such meeting. If any person entitled to such written notice files a written waiver of notice with the City Clerk, it may be dispensed with. This notice requirement shall be considered fulfilled as to any person who is actually present at the meeting at the time it convenes. In the event of an emergency affecting the public peace, health or safety, a special meeting may be called as provided in this section with less than twenty-four hours written notice by the Mayor Pro Tem in the Mayor's absence or by any member of the City Council in the absence of both the Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem provided that the nature of the emergency is set forth in the minutes of the meeting.

(c) **Place of Meetings.** All regular meetings shall be held in the Council Chambers of the City or in such place within the City to which any such meeting may be adjourned. If, by reason of fire, flood or other emergency, it shall be unsafe to meet in the place designated, the meetings may be held for the duration of the emergency at such place within the City as is designated by the Mayor, or, if ~~he~~ the Mayor should fail to act, by a majority of the members of the City Council.

(d) **Open Meetings.** All regular and special meetings of the City Council shall be open and public, and all persons shall be permitted to attend such meetings, except that the provisions of this section shall not apply to ~~executive~~ closed sessions. Subject to the rules governing the conduct of City Council meetings, no person shall be denied the right to be heard by the City Council.

(e) **Dissemination of Information.** The City Council shall adopt rules to ensure thorough and timely dissemination of information via current technology by resolution.

Section 304. QUORUMS, PROCEEDINGS AND RULES OF ORDER.

(a) **Quorum.** A majority of the members of the City Council shall constitute a quorum to do business but a lesser number may adjourn from time to time. In the absence of all the members of the City Council from any regular meeting or adjourned regular meeting, the City Clerk may declare the same adjourned to a stated day and hour. The City Clerk shall cause written notice of a meeting adjourned by less than a quorum or by the City Clerk to be delivered personally, ~~or by mail~~ or by current technology to each Council member at least twenty-four hours before the time to which the meeting is adjourned, or such notice may be dispensed with in the same manner as specified in this Charter for dispensing with notice of special meetings of the City Council.

Section 311. CITY TREASURER. POWERS AND DUTIES.

(d) Prepare and submit to the ~~Director of Finance~~ Chief Financial Officer monthly written reports of all receipts, disbursements and fund balances, and shall file copies of such reports with the City Manager and City Council.

Section 312. VACANCIES, FORFEITURES AND REPLACEMENT.

(a) **Vacancies.** A vacancy in the City Council or in any other office designated as elective by this Charter, from whatever cause arising, shall be filled by appointment by the City Council with at least four affirmative votes.

(b) **Forfeiture.** If a member of the City Council is absent from all regular meetings of the City Council for a period of thirty consecutive days from and after the last regular City Council meeting attended by such member, unless by permission of the City Council expressed in its official minutes, the office shall become vacant. If an elected City officer pleads guilty or no contest to or is convicted of a felony or any crime of moral turpitude, or ceases to be an elector of the City, the office shall become vacant. The City Council shall declare the existence of such vacancy. Any elective officer of the City who shall accept or retain any other elective public office, except as provided in this Charter, shall be deemed thereby to have vacated the office under the City Government.

(c) **Replacement.** In the event ~~the City Council~~ shall fail to fill a vacancy by appointment within sixty days after such office shall become vacant, the City Council shall forthwith cause an election to be held to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term. If the City Council fills the vacancy by appointment, such appointee shall hold office until an election to fill the remainder of the unexpired term at the next general municipal election. Should the appointment occur after the filing deadline for the next general municipal election, the seat shall be deemed vacant upon the certification of the general municipal election, and the vacancy shall be filled in accordance with Sections 312(a) and 312(c).

Section 400. CITY MANAGER. COMPOSITION, TERM, ELIGIBILITY, REMOVAL.

(d) **Removal.** The City Manager shall not be removed from office during or within a period of ninety days next succeeding any municipal election at which a member of the City Council is elected. At any other time the City Manager may be removed only at a regular meeting of the City Council and upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the City Council. At least thirty days prior to the effective date of removal, the City Manager shall be furnished with a written notice stating the Council's intentions and, if requested by the City Manager, the reasons therefor. Within seven days after receipt of such notice, the City Manager may by written notification to the City Clerk request a public hearing before the City Council, in which event the Council shall fix a time for a public hearing which shall be held at its regular meeting place before the expiration of the thirty-day period above referred to. The City Manager shall appear and be heard at such hearing. After furnishing the City Manager with written notice of the intended removal, the City Council may suspend the City Manager from duty, but ~~his~~ the City Manager's compensation shall continue until removal as herein provided. In removing the City Manager, the City Council shall use its uncontrolled discretion and its action shall be final and shall not depend upon any particular showing or degree of proof at the hearing, the purpose of which is to allow the City Council and the City Manager to present to each other and to the public all pertinent facts prior to the final action of removal.

Section 401. POWERS AND DUTIES.

(b) Prepare the budget ~~annually~~ as required by this Charter, submit it to the City Council, and be responsible for its administration upon adoption.

Section 601. ~~BIENNIAL ANNUAL~~ BUDGET, PREPARATION BY THE CITY MANAGER.

At such date as the City Manager shall determine, each board or commission and each department head shall furnish to the City Manager, personally, or through the ~~Director of Finance~~ Chief Financial Officer, estimates of the department's, board's or commission's revenue and expenditures for the ensuing two fiscal years, detailed in such manner as may be prescribed by the City Manager. In preparing the proposed budget, the City Manager shall review the estimates, hold conferences thereon with the respective department heads, boards or commissions as necessary, and may revise the estimates as may be deemed advisable.

Section 602. ~~BIENNIAL ANNUAL~~ BUDGET. SUBMISSION TO THE CITY COUNCIL.

The City Manager shall submit the proposed budget to the City Council at least thirty days prior to the beginning of each even numbered fiscal year beginning in 2026. After reviewing the proposed budget and making such revisions as it may deem advisable, the City Council shall hold a public hearing thereon at least fifteen days prior to the beginning of each even numbered fiscal year and shall cause to be published a notice thereof not less than ten days prior to said hearing. Copies of the proposed budget shall be available for inspection by the public in the office of the City Clerk at least ten days prior to said hearing.

Section 603. ~~BIENNIAL ANNUAL~~ BUDGET. PUBLIC HEARING.

At the time so advertised or at any time to which such public hearing shall from time to time be adjourned, the City Council shall hold a public hearing on the proposed budget, at which interested persons desiring to be heard shall be given such opportunity.

Section 604. ~~BIENNIAL ANNUAL~~ BUDGET. FURTHER CONSIDERATION AND ADOPTION.

At the conclusion of the public hearing the City Council shall further consider the proposed budget and make any revisions thereof that it may deem advisable and on or before the last day of the fiscal year it shall adopt the budget with revisions, if any, by the affirmative vote of at least a majority of the total members of the Council. Upon final adoption, the budget shall be in effect for the ensuing two fiscal years. Copies thereof, certified by the City Clerk, shall be filed with the City Manager, ~~Director of Finance~~ Chief Financial Officer, City Treasurer and the person retained by the City Council to perform the post audit function, and a further copy shall be placed, and shall remain on file in the office of the City Clerk where it shall be available for public inspection. The budget so certified shall be reproduced and copies made available for the use of the public and of departments, offices and agencies of the City.

Section 605. ~~BIENNIAL ANNUAL~~ BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS.

From the effective date of the budget, the several amounts stated therein as proposed expenditures shall be and become appropriated to

the several departments, offices and agencies for the respective objects and purposes therein named; provided, however, that the City Manager may transfer funds from one object or purpose to another within the same department, office or agency. All appropriations shall lapse at the end of the second fiscal year to the extent that they shall not have been expended or lawfully encumbered.

At any public meeting after the adoption of the budget, the City Council may amend or supplement the budget by motion adopted by the affirmative vote of at least a majority of the total members of the City Council.

Section 801. DEFINITIONS. Unless the provisions or the context otherwise requires, as used in this Charter:

- (a) "Shall" is mandatory, and "may" is permissive.
- (b) "City" is the City of Huntington Beach and "department," "board," "commission," "agency," "officer," or "employee" is a department, board, commission, agency, officer or employee, as the case may be, of the City of Huntington Beach.
- (c) "County" is the County of Orange.
- (d) "State" is the State of California.
- ~~(e) The masculine includes the feminine and the feminine includes the masculine.~~
- ~~(f) The singular includes the plural and the plural the singular.~~
- ~~(g) "Person" includes firm and corporation.~~

Section 804. CHARTER REVIEW. The City Council shall determine if there is a need to convene a citizen's Charter Review Commission to conduct a review of the City Charter no less frequently than every ten years from the most recent formal Charter review conducted by a Charter Revision Commission, City Council, or City staff.

CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE 3

This proposed Charter amendment, if adopted, would amend the Charter both substantively and non-substantively. The first substantive amendment by this ballot measure changes several sections of the Charter to require the City to adopt a biennial (two-year) budget, instead of an annual (one-year) budget.

The second substantive amendment is to Charter Section 303(a) which currently requires City Council to hold regular meetings at least twice a month. If adopted, the Charter would be amended to allow for the Mayor or a majority of Council to cancel regular City Council meetings, but in no event will the City Council meet less than once per month.

The third substantive amendment is to Charter Section 312, related to City Council vacancies. Currently, a person appointed by the City Council to fill a Council vacancy serves the remainder of the unexpired term. If adopted, this measure would require that the appointee hold office only until an election to fill the remainder of the unexpired term, at the next general municipal election.

Additional proposed amendments to several Charter Sections are non-substantive, meaning amendments to clarify or update language in the Charter regarding outdated phrases, syntax, dates, pronouns and titles. For example, changes to Section 300 would update the election years for elected officials and makes clear that in the event of a tie vote during an election, a random drawing will occur. Changes to Section 303 would update the Charter to allow the use of "current technology" to distribute notices, change the words "executive session" to "closed session" because closed session is the current statutory term, as well as clarify the process of adjourning City Council meetings. Changes to Sections 303(c), 312(c), 400(d), and 801(e) would replace pronouns "he" or "it" with "person" or the title being referred to, and changes to Sections 311(d), 601, and 604 would replace "Director of Finance" with the updated title of "Chief Financial Officer." An amendment to Section 804 would clarify when the City Council must determine whether to convene a citizen's Charter Review Commission.

A "yes" vote on this measure would approve these changes to the City Charter. A "no" vote on this measure would not approve them.
